Thanks for downloading this freebie! These Passion Week cards are designed to help you remember the events that happened between Palm Sunday and Resurrection Sunday. There is a front and a back to each card. On the front of each card there is a modern design inspired by stained glass seen in traditional churches. And on the back of each card there is a timeline of the events that occurred on that day, a notes section, and bible references. The document has been set up so that you can print accordingly.

Directions: scroll to the next page and print the front side of the cards, pages 2-5, on 8.5" X 11" sheets of paper. Then, print the back of the cards, pages 6-9, on the backside of the sheets of paper. I recommend using heavy card stock paper for sturdiness. For a more precise line, use an exacto knife and ruler to cut along the borders.

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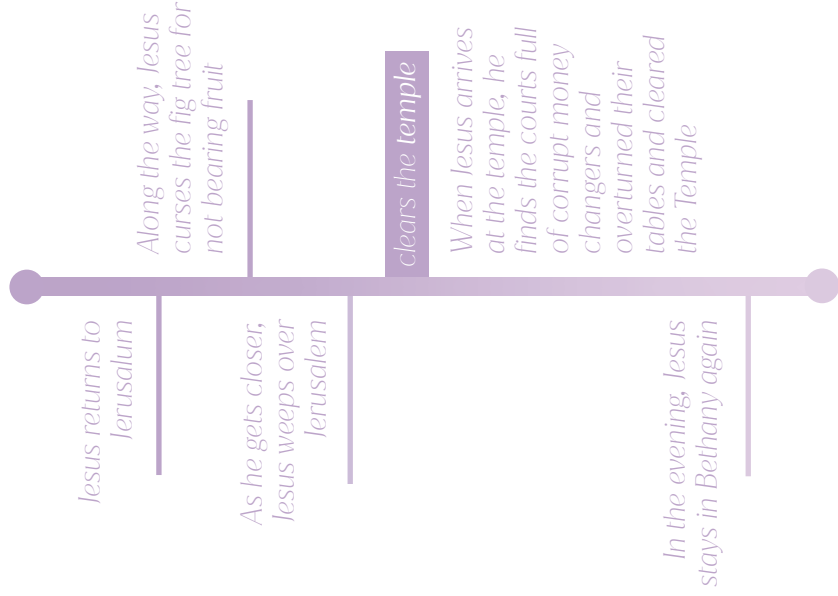

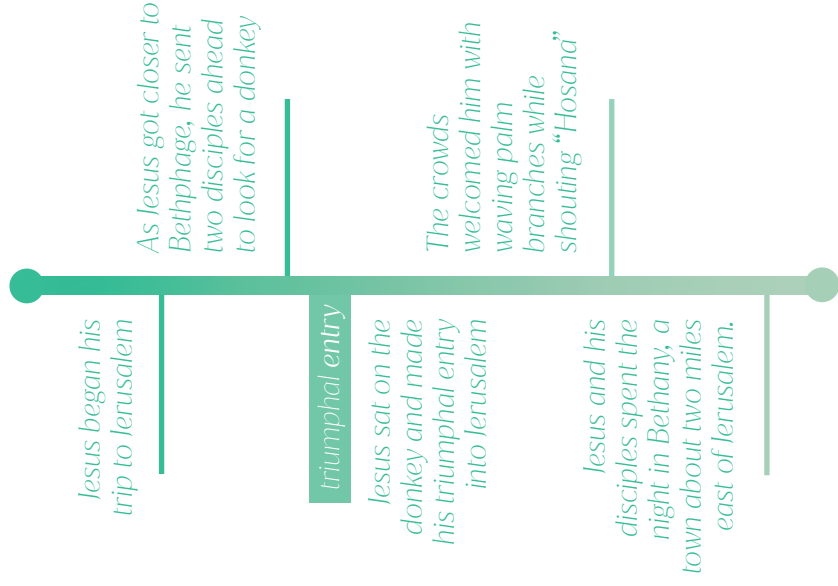






monday

Matthew 21:12-22, Mark 11:15-19, Luke 19:45-48, and John 2:13-17.



palm sunday

Zechariah 9:9, Matthew 21:1-11, Mark 11:1-11, Luke 19:28-44, and John 12:12-19.

There's no record in the Bible about what Jesus was doing on Wednesday

Scholars speculate that Jesus and his disciples were preparing for Passover

Jesus remains in Bethany throughout the day and stays the night there

silent wednesday

Jesus travels back to Jerusalem

Finds the fig tree has withered and teaches on faith

When Jesus arrives at temple, the religious leaders try to ambush him in order to arrest him

Jesus evades arrest and pronounces judgement on the religious leaders

olivet discourse

Jesus leaves the city and delivers the Olivet Discourse on the way back to Bethany

Judas bargains with Sanhedrin to betray Jesus

Jesus spends the night in Bethany

tuesday

Matthew 21:12-22, Mark 11:15-19, Luke 19:45-48, and John 2:13-17.

Judas commits suicide

the trials of Jesus

After six unlawful trials, Jesus is sentenced to death by crucifixion. One of the most terrible methods of capital punishment known at the time

seven final statements

Jesus spoke seven final statements from the cross. His first statement was, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."

Jesus endures shame of false accusations, condemnation, mockery, beatings, and abandonment.

walk to Golgotha

Soldiers pierce Jesus with a crown of thorns, Jesus carries his own cross to Calvary, and is nailed to the wooden cross

Around 3pm Jesus dies and the veil in the temple is torn in half

By 6pm Jesus' body is taken down from the cross and layed in the tomb

good friday

Matthew 27:1-62, Mark 15:1-47, Luke 22:63-23:56, and John 18:28-19:37.

Jesus sends Peter & John ahead to the Upper Room in Jerusalem to setup the Passover meal

After sunset, Jesus washed the feet of the disciples and shares the Passover Feast with them

the last supper

Jesus institutes the Lord's Supper, or Communion, as a remembrance of his coming sacrifice

garden of Gethsemane

Jesus and his disciples head to the garden of Gethsemane, where Jesus agonizes in prayer

Judas betrays Jesus with a kiss and Jesus is arrested by the Sanhedrin

As Jesus' trial was getting underway, Peter denied knowing him three times before the rooster crowed

maundy thursday

Matthew 26:17-75, Mark 14:12-72, Luke 22:7-62, and John 13:1-38.

the resurrection

In the morning, several women went to Jesus' tomb and discovered that the stone to the entrance had been rolled away

Jesus made at least five appearances on the day of his resurrection

Before dawn, Jesus rises from the dead

An angel tells the women to not be afraid for Jesus has risen from the dead just as he said he would

The first person Jesus appeared to was Mary Magdalene. Jesus then appeared to Peter, to the two disciples on the road to Emmaus, and finally to all of the disciples gathered in a house for prayer.

Jesus' body lay in the tomb where it was guarded by Roman soldiers at the request of Jewish leadership

When the Sabbath ended at 6pm, Jesus' body was ceremonially treated for burial by Nicodemus

While Jesus' body layed in the tomb, he payed the price for sin by offering himself as a perfect sacrifice. He conquered death, both spiritually and physically

resurrection sunday

Matthew 28:1-13, Mark 16:1-14, Luke 24:1-49, and John 20:1-23.

saturday

Matthew 27:62-66, Mark 16:1, Luke 23:56, and John 19:40.
